MAAP- PAEPI JR CLUB HISTORY

The idea of establishing a Junior PAEPI Club of the Maritime Academy of Asia and the Pacific (PAEPI Student Chapter) was conceived on November 12, 2010, over a cup of coffee after the holy evening mass for the AMOSUP and MAAP visionary founder Capt Gregorio S Oca, MM (RIP), when Midshipman First Class Xavier P. Yumang discussed with Dr. Angelica “Lizette” M. Baylon, President of the Philippine Association of Extension Programs and Implementers (PAEPI) and MAAP Director for Research and Extension Services, about the various planned projects of some members of Class 2011. One of the projects was a gift giving activity in December 2010. Pleased with the advocacy of these MAAP volunteer students and considering that these are similar with the PAEPI vision, mission, goals and objectives, Dr. Baylon thought of putting up PAEPI Junior clubs similar with the UNYAP among all its institutional member schools considering that extension programs and the objective of student volunteers as extension services implementers are common.

From then on, 1cl Yumang recruited possible MAAP cadets who are willing and interested to be the extension services implementing arm at the academy in support to the advocacy and VMGO of PAEPI and UNAP. He then reported the developments to Dr. Baylon. On December 1, 2010, Dr. Baylon met and discussed with the new members about PAEPI, their responsibilities and satisfaction that may be derived from volunteering works prior to the intended election of officers and induction of members.

The Class 2011 (graduating batch) becomes the pioneer senior members with some of the 4th and 3rd class midshipmen, to ensure continuity and proper turn-over of tasks once the senior members graduated from MAAP with a pledge that the pioneer PAEPI junior of Class 2011 even after graduation would continuously be a member of PAEPI and would support the MAAP-PAEPI junior Club for its sustainability and realization of its programs and projects for the community.

On December 3, 2010, the MAAP PAEPI Junior Club was formally founded with the oath taking of the pioneering batch of Officers and Members with their adviser Dr. Baylon as the officiating officer.

On December 15, 2010 the first documented project of this newly organized club was conducted at Brgy. Petron 230 of Mariveles, Bataan with the theme “JUST PAY US WITH SMILES”. The project successfully provided a Noche-Buena package for 65 families residing on that area. This activity brought joy to the indigent families and to the volunteering MAAP Jr PAEP Club members who contributed their personal money in partnership with MAAP community, Philippine Ports Authority, GASFI and local government units. The MAAP PAEPI Club may be newly established and organized; however, the volunteering extension services work of the students have been continuously done over the years since MAAP started its operation in 1999. Class 2011, for instance, have already been conducting various volunteering services namely: tree planting, coastal clean-up, Brigada Eskwela, feeding program, book donation, Christmas cheers and read aloud activities for children ever since they have been admitted at MAAP as 4th class midshipmen in 2008.

On February 3, 2011, the MAAP PAEPI Junior Club submitted an improved PAEPI logo their club which was adapted by the National PAEPI.

On April 26, 2011, the MAAP PAEPI Junior Club, together with their counterpart at Bataan Peninsula State University, was formally accredited by the UNESCO at MAAP campus, Mariveles, Bataan.

RATIONALE

The MOA signing of PAEPI with the United Nations Association of the Philippines (UNAP) in July 2009 at the Manila Ocean Park, had certainly enriched the PAEPI Extension Services programs. In support to UNAP thrust and the Philippine government, MDGs are integrated in the PAEPI extension programs for implementation by the respective PAEPI member institutions. In addition, a 14-page full paper entitled “INTEGRATING MDGs IN PLANNING, IMPLEMENTATION, MONITORING AND EVALUATION OF PAEPI EXTENSION PROGRAMS” have been prepared and presented on August 6, 2009 with the educator and student participants nationwide in attendance.

With the PAEPI’s active participation in the 10th International Youth Day and Youth and Educators Summit on August 5-7, 2009 at the University of Makati with Dr. Baylon and 6 MAAP student participants along with the other PAEPI members institutions (Bataan Peninsula State University, University of Zamboanga, Sultan Kudarat Polytechnic State University, Lyceum of Batangas, Letran College, Baliuag University, PMMA, Cebu Doctors University etc) and their advisers and students coupled with PAEPI’s development thrusts on internationalization of education and services, several linkages and partnerships with Indonesia have been achieved and soon with others through internationalization. PAEPI would soon be able to contribute in the MDG number 8 which is “develop a global partnership for development thru its students and educators”, prior to the 2015 countdown. Furthermore, impressed with UNAP with its commendable youth arm (UNYAP), PAEPI is inspired to include membership of students/youths as its arm and encourage volunteer youth leaders to join PAEPI so their capabilities will be further enhanced into professional youth leaders.

The rationale behind, is premised on the implementation of the extension program in HEIs through the actual immersion and exposure of students or youth. One very important guideline is the students’ or youths’ communicating respect. Community involvement and a life of service are not learned through books and classrooms alone. Experiences, actual exposure and immersion in life’s realities are usually the best teachers for the youth. In all these activities, a student’s role is as a learner. The student’s tasks from the actual immersion and exposure are to participate, observe, document, report, reflect and evaluate. PAEPI aims for the development of a sense of responsibility together with the development of social integration. Exposure and immersion of professional faculty/staff and students in the communities can be seen as relevant learning opportunities. From the learner’s experiential data, one draws conclusions and insights. A kind of learning-teaching process that is usually needed for a socially significant, effective and knowledge is an integrated approach. A student achieves social integration when he sees interconnections between his experiences and the core courses he has taken up so far thus ensuring the accomplishment of PAEPI mission in developing professional extension services implementers with character, knowledge, and skills necessary for the successful pursuit and implementation of the extension programs which PAEPI stands for.

Moreover, founded on the very reason of extension service, PAEPI Junior was established as an organization that believes in the idea of volunteerism, education and training, research and development and many other forms of action actively participating in the community development projects/programs in a climate where there is a sense of respect, and understanding of common objectives by which to effect educational institutions’ efforts towards attainment of community related goals and objectives. This would certainly make educational programs more dynamic and friendly not only within the institution but also in the larger community and the nation in general. The JR PAEPI of MAAP was established with these core values and goals.

MISSION

To bring Extension to the level of its disciple and as a professional volunteer student services implementers, in pursuit of its goal to improve educational environment thru Research and improvement of the community thru outreach and extension services.

VISION

The JR PAEPI envisions itself as the key player in people empowerment and development and as a strong and reputable PAEPI Jr Club of student extension services implementers providing outreach programs and extension services I in partnership with Local and International stakeholders that would develop, empower and uplift the lives of the people for better and sustainable world.

OBJECTIVES

The objective of the JR PAEPI is to elevate extension services implementation into a level of discipline vital to effective individual and social transformation, to build and upgrade the capabilities and professionalism of student extensionists to be of better service in the community as we initiate funded programs, projects and activities in partnership with other stakeholders beneficial to all concerned.

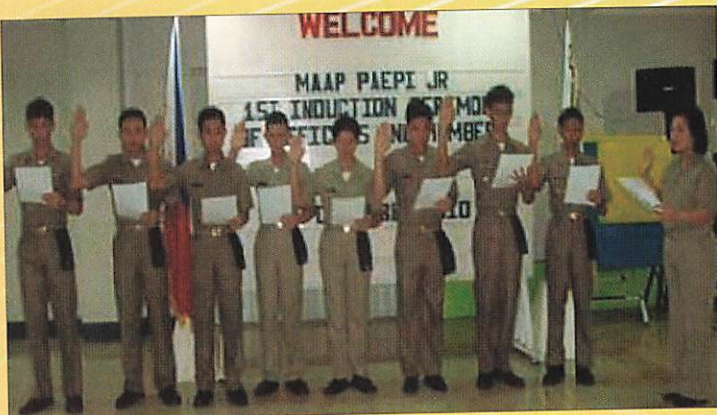

First National PAEPI, PHILARM and PFUCCA Student Researchers and Awarding
of Best Research and Extension Practices

The field of research and extension among the ranks of students has started to gain ground as the Maritime Academy of Asia and the Pacific (VADM Eduardo Ma R. Santos, AFP (Ret) and the Bataan Peninsula State University (BPSU President Dr Delfin Magpantay) in collaboration with : Philippine Association of Extension Program Implementers, Inc (Dr Angelica Baylon), Philippine Association of Research Managers (Dr Reynaldo Castro) and the Philippine Federation of UNESCO Clubs, Chapters and Associations (Prof Serafin Arviola of PNU). A groundbreaking activity for student researchers and extensionists was organized, coinciding with the accreditation ceremony of PAEPI Student Clubs in the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) Clubs, April 26-27, 2011 at the MAAP Campus in Kamaya Point, Mariveles, Bataan.

The event also served as the grand launching of the BPSU and MAAP PAEPI Student Clubs as recognized UNESCO Clubs, joining the first 10 founding members who came from different parts of the country. "I felt extreme fulfillment as I see our students display passion towards community work, extension and research. The accreditation of our pilot PAEPI student chapters (BPSU and MAAP) only makes it more exciting to continue our efforts in advocating the foundational beliefs of PAEPI, which is community service with a heart!", says Dr. Angelica Baylon, the MAAP's Director of Research and Extension Services and PAEPI President in an interview.

Dr. Angelica Baylon, MAAP Director for Research and Extension Services, emphasized in her speech that the activities were realized and made possible because of the admirable leadership of VAdm Santos, who always supports the activities of students in partnership with other organizations. UNESCO Exec Director Tuason congratulated the various organizations, for making the said event successful. According to her, pushing through some extension activities is so hard but the organization makes it possible. Ms. Tuason awarded the accreditation certificate of the two new family members of UNESCO Clubs Philippines : MAAP-PAEPI Student Chapter led by its President ICL Xavier Yumang and BPSU-PAEPI Student

Chapter with Mr. John Mark Caraan as their President. The respective Certificates of Accreditation and plaques from UNESCO were given to the new member organizations as a symbol of partnership for future collaborative UNESCO and PAEPI Student Chapters' projects. In the speech delivered by Dr. Daryl Macer, he discussed the problem of Mass Killing which is the focus of his project this year. He encouraged all the delegates to support the project so as to stop this unethical activity. He added that sooner or later, this problem will be added on UNESCO's main agenda

The UNESCO Clubs held their Assembly meeting and also discussed the country's participation in International Youth Day (IYD) in Vietnam . Training session for the students extensionists focused on Advanced Leadership Concepts with emphasis on community extension. Dr. Perla B. Estrella, BPSU-Associate Director for Extension Services and a licensed Psychologist, discussed about the different character of a good person and leader. Another BPSU Instructor, Mrs. Kimberly Cabrera-Rivera, who was former BPSU student leader and a regional nominee for the Outstanding students of the Philippines, helped pull out the leadership principles and values among the student-participants. In the research presentation, student extensionists from various clubs presented their student-led extension programs to the panel created for evaluation of project effectiveness. Dr. Reynaldo Castro, the PhilARM Chair served as the Chairman of the panel of judges. The oral presentations showcased the students' creativity and skills in taking part to their respective institution's research and extension programs. The students who topped the competitions were: Ms. Judith A. Oria (First Place), from the Bataan Peninsula State University; 4CL Jo-Mari Hieras and 4CL Kristofer Bang (Second Place) from Maritime Academy of Asia and the Pacific and Ms. Leah Pearl Eugenio (Third Place) from Bataan Peninsula State University. Dr. Elizabeth A. Jolson, Director of BPSU Extension Services, and Ms. Janice W. Vergara, statistician and MAAP-Department of Research and Extension Services Staff served as critique for the 15 presenters. The 2-day groundbreaking activity ended with a fellowship night at MAAP's Aguinaldo Hall. MAAP cadettes who are also members of both the UNESCO Clubs and PAEPI Student clubs wowed the delegates with their special numbers which include a modern dance number and a fire dance exhibition by the cadets . A ceremonial boodle fight was shared by all the student delegates who capped another historic event hosted by MAAP and BPSU. MAAP as host also toured the delegates at its amazing campus and had actually experienced its state of the art simulator found only in MAAP Philippines, Canada and Australia.. Aboard the MAAP air-conditioned bus, the guests also toured some historical places in Bataan like Mount Samat, to the delight of the participants.
