13. Dr. Baylon emphasized that on the program of activities, it can be surmised that the **schedule within the day is extensive yet productive**. While the background organizations of the conference were prepared, it is still the inputs, ideas, and passion of everyone that will determine its success, relevance, and benefits to us maritime leaders in this changing world.

14. Opening and Welcome Remarks by VADM Eduardo Ma. R Santos, AFP (Ret), AFNI, FImarEST NI/IMarEST Ph Branch President, Royal Institute of Maritime Management (RIMM) Singapore President PAEPI Global Adviser and IMO Goodwill Ambassador

1. VADM Santos greeted the esteemed guests and participants. He expressed his happiness for hosting the event after an absence of almost three years to continue working, networking, and doing our complex tasks of Leadership in the maritime service. VADM Santos mentioned the **MOA signing between Nautical Institute and MARINA**. He expressed that this tie-up with international professional institutions such as NI and IMarEST will help MARINA and, ultimately, the seafarers desiring to work onboard foreign vessels.

2. Concerning the theme of Leadership in this changing world, VADM Santos expressed that it is not only changing but challenging. He said that we have double disruption, not just in the maritime sector, but in the world, by the two-letter *deltas*: **digitalization** and **decarbonization**. So, it is a **changing and challenging world**, as everyone knows it is volatile. The big initial that applies to everyone, aside from being volatile, uncertain, changing, and all the chaos which may come in the future, is vulnerability. He stated that we don't know what is coming, we don't know what to teach, and we don't know how to prepare. Still, we have to continue being aware, adjusting, and aligning to cope with the challenges brought about by these two changes.

3. He stressed that they, as leaders, to make good decisions in light of our vulnerabilities, must remain cool, calm, and collected to be able to think and decide and select the best possible options that would benefit themselves and their subordinates.

4. VADM Santos emphasized that everyone is lucky to be a member of the Nautical Institute, with **CEO Capt. John Lloyd** will be discussing the **NI Strategic Plans.** He added that we are fortunate that NI continues to help us in our continuing professional development. He said that their publication, studies, and accreditations assure the Members that they will weather through the issues they face on **digitalization** (including Artificial Intelligence, unmanned ships, etc.) and **decarbonization** brought about by COP 27. The International Maritime Organization is pushing to attain the standards/goals required for decarbonization.

5. Vadm Santos also mentioned the previous **NI/IMarEST Ph branch technical talk** done about five years ago. The organization invited an expert who discussed reducing additives emitting harmful chemicals in the atmosphere as these are causing more damaging greenhouse gas effects, such as more intensified and destructive typhoons, etc. IMO is pushing us to attain a 50% reduction in greenhouse gas by 2030 and net zero carbon by 2050. He stressed that the issue raised by the seafarers five years ago was, 'what will happen to our jobs? Now, seafarers are all the more anxious about their jobs with the current issues they are facing. Positively, he emphasized that the maritime industry has just transitioned to make every effort to **ensure that seafarers will not be left behind**. He said that this transition is a difficult task. Many seafarers are getting old and quite challenging to teach. However, all of these will depend on how they educate/train seafarers and cadets, the future seafarers, to ensure they can face digitalization and decarbonization challenges.

6. VADM Santos expressed that he is glad we have NI on our backs and the government with the MARINA. He added that **many challenges affect our Leadership**. We must understand what is happening, be aware, adjust, align, and move on, ensuring seafarers remain in their jobs. Finally, he said that he hopes all will learn and benefit from the meeting and have more meetings and more fellowships to coordinate with one another to help everyone make **smarter, safer, and saner decisions**.

7. Finally, VADM Santos formally declared the program officially open.

1. Director Sunico expressed his appreciation for being invited to the NI event. On behalf of **TESDA in the National Capital Region**, he greeted the NI Ph branch for conducting its 2022 event commemorating NI's golden anniversary.

2. He said that as the primary agency of the Philippine government tasked with the critical role of developing workers in the mid-level sector, **TESDA shares in the goal and aspirations of the Nautical Institute in promoting and maintaining high standards of quality and excellence in the maritime education industry**. 

**Dr. Angelica Baylon** introduced the next speaker, the PAEPI Global Chair Dr. Christina Dragomir of Constanta Maritime University, Romania and received the plaque of appreciation for PAEPI Global Chair

**Dr. Cristina Dragomir** is PAEPI Global Chair, scholar, and gender equality expert, with input in developing fair access to education and employment in maritime transport. Dr. Dragomir is an associate professor at Constanta Maritime University from Romania and the General Secretary of the professional association for women WISTA Romania. She has given lectures on Transport Technologies, Management of Ship Commercial Operations, and Human Resources Management since 2008, being invited as a lecturer at other universities and as a speaker at international and national events. She is a reviewer for prestigious SSCI journals.

• **Special Message by Dr. Cristina Dragomir, PhDm** PAEPI-Global Chair, Constanta Maritime University (Romania) Professor, Secretary General – WISTA -Romania President, European Social Corporate Responsibility





1. Dr. Dragomir shared her message **about Leadership**, **maritime transport**, **and education**. She stated that maritime transport leaders and managers are complementary entities, distinguished primarily by their motivation, thinking, and action.

2. Dr. Dragomir compared onboard ship and shipping scenarios with masters' and ship managers' **leadership roles and responsibilities**.

3. Dr. Dragomir mentioned several **maritime issues and concerns**, including discrimination and harassment situations facing women seafarers. The good news is that maritime trade unions provide instant support and advice for these concerns.

4. Dr. Dragomir also stressed the **leadership role of maritime universities** in tackling issues such as cultural diversity, which is being blamed for many problems and challenges not only in shipping but in the world. She defined cultural diversity as the representation of people in a social system with apparent differences in cultural group membership.

5. She said that maritime education training is crucial in molding future seafarers who are gender and culturally sensitive. Hence, she suggested that educational institutions adopt effective **gender-inclusive strategies and pedagogical and didactic approaches**. Teaching students in a culture-sensitive learning environment will help them become sensitive to other cultures, even when working on board vessels.

6. Dr. Dragomir emphasized that **METIs play multifaceted roles** in educating their students to be equipped with the technical knowledge, skills, and attitude with sensitive minds and characters that understand and adapt to diverse cultural orientations. She added that maritime education should also develop students with a mindset that removes gender biases, rises above cultural differences, and **increases gender and cultural awareness** by integrating such ideas into the **curriculum and instruction**.

7. Dr. Dragomir stressed adapting collaborative learning as an alternative method to promote **complementary leadership roles amidst diverse gender and cultural orientations** to attain group goals. She also expressed that students learn target lessons or skills in a collaborative setting as they participate according to their assigned roles.

8. She added that METIs provide **equal leadership opportunities to male and female students**. She said that the female presence in METIs played a significant part in governance, policy and decision-making, curriculum and course design, and curricular and extracurricular activities. She also encouraged respect for cultural identity and diversity by adapting leadership skills that equally engage male and female students. She also encouraged developing communicative competence to prepare students for the future.

9. Finally, Dr. Dragomir expressed that she firmly believes that **working together within the maritime cluster** as maritime stakeholders can help the development of the global society. She sends her best wishes to all.



• Launching of NCAP (Navozyme – Certificate Authentication Platform) Wallet App for MAAP Cadets by Atty./Capt. Jitesh Jaipuriyar, Navozyme Singapore, PRO of RI Maritime Management Singapore



1. Captain Jaipuriyar engaged four MAAP cadets to re-emphasize the **four factors discussed by VADM Santos** on change, challenge, digitalization, and decarbonization.

2. With the help of the students, Captain Jaipuriyar demonstrated digitalization with a difference. He officially launched the **NCAP wallet app**. He instructed the cadets to use their IOS and download the app. They entered their email and obtained a QR code which helped them recognize their **credentials digitally**.

3. The NCAP wallet allows users to issue, verify, manage, and revoke all digital credentials in real time. It includes security features against cyber security. It is flexible and valuable for digital needs.



 MAAP President VAdm Santos on the Launching of Blockchain Program for the MAAP Cadets.

1. VAdm Santos, with Capt. Jitesh Jaipuriyar launched the blockchain program for the cadets. With him are the cadets for the Maritime Academy of Asia and the Pacific showing their page for the blockchain on their gadgets (cell phones or iPad).

2. VADM Santos stated that all the cadets' certificates, including their medical certificates, would be uploaded to their **e-wallet dashboard.** When they board ships, they will show their page to the port state controller, who scans it so that the port state control will know that they have authentic documents.

3. VADM Santos added that with the **launching of this blockchain e-wallet**, the five (5) cadets with him are the first to have it, and all the other MAAP cadets will have theirs soon. He also mentioned that after MAAP cadets, the seafarers would have this blockchain program so that Filipino seafarers do not need to bring all their original certificates and lose them on the way. They will have their e-wallet with their authentic and correct documents. He emphasized that all **MAAP cadets**, **AMOSUP seafarers**, **and the Filipino fleet** would be enrolled in the **blockchain program**.

4. VAdm Santos also relayed that the shipowners and agents can access the files on a limited basis, depending on the data privacy commitments, so that they can see everything about their cadets and seafarers in their companies. This **digital program** is going to be the **first in the Philippines**, first for seafarers. He stressed that they are trying to do their best to make the lives of cadets and seafarers as easy as possible.



 Presentation of the Adopt-A-Ship Program by IMO Goodwill Ambassador George Hoyt, FNI

**1.** Mr. Hoyt stated that one of the biggest challenges we have, which we have encouraged for many years, is that we live in an **invisible industry**, working in an invisible industry. He stated that the United Nations has been able to help us make seafarers essential workers. This is just one of the prime examples of the challenges our seafarers and the entire maritime industry are having, being recognized as an industry responsible for the safety and quality of life of everyone on the planet.

2. He mentioned that some of the speakers today will talk about important areas like getting **young people** involved in the industry.

3. Mr. Hoyt introduced one of their programs called Adopt-A-Ship which was started in Cyprus and **digitalized in 2016**. It consists of a seafarer on board, usually the master, exchanging an email with a teacher of an elementary school classroom or shelter for an activity once a week. The teacher with the pupils gets to the map and follow the ship in the oceans, and they **learn about geography through maritime.** This program has been very successful. In 2019, they had over **30,000 children** participating (most of them here in the Philippines) since they started the program.

4. He encouraged the participants to get involved with this **free program** as they needed participation and support to try to regain the program and expand. He added that the United Nations working group, the IMO Secretary General, **Nautical Institute**, and many other organizations are involved.

5. Mr. Hoyt expressed his hope that the participants help them bring the program to the children in the Philippines. He stated that the maritime industry today is not sustainable. He added that no industry is sustainable without getting the **female population** into.



6. He stressed that **Adopt-A-Ship** brings young people, 10 to 12 years old, into the industry by introducing them to the program.

7. He said they need more **young ladies** to stay with them, maybe not on board but somewhere in the maritime community

8. He said they are working with the **GOLD Foundation**, run by **Ms. Marissa Oca**, doing a lot of welfare programs for seafarers and their families. He also mentioned that they have a coordinator, MAAP graduate, here.



 Presentation: Developing Executive Leadership
 Presence by Capt. Emerson
 Reyes, MNI, PgD (EMM)
 Crewing Manager, Fukijin Kisen

1. Captain Reyes discussed **valuable factors in developing executive leadership** presence. He quotes that *"the stakes are high but so the dissatisfaction."* Executive Leaders must serve people, help them succeed, and have significant value.

2. Capt. Reyes also shared his four steps/lesson experiences as a Captain, Chief Officer, and Crewing Manager at 36. He stressed that trust is an essential step that leaders should develop from their school years to their professional time. He mentioned **three key factors of development**: reliability, credibility, and connection.

3. Capt. Reves stated, *"Executive Leadership is like an ocean voyage discovery, and you're the captain."* He further explained that Executive Leadership has **four Disciplines**: setting direction, motivating commitment, driving for results, and developing yourself toward excellence. He also thanked NI as he was a recipient of a scholarship grant for short course at World Maritime University in Malmo Sweden.



 Presentation: Quality Leadership and Excellence Change Management from a Seafarer Youth Perspective by 3/O Yrhen Bernard S Balinis, MRIN, AMNI, AMIMarEST Seafarer (Operational), IMO Goodwill Ambassador



- 3/O Balinis shared his insights on Quality Leadership Management from a Seafarer Youth Perspective. Leaders should know how to listen to their constituents and subordinates. Leaders stand for L-leadership, E-empathy, A-assertiveness, D-discernment, E-excellent, and R-relationship. Leadership can be democratic, transactional, autocratic, and coaching, depending on the situation.
- 2. He also gave insights on Gen Z and Millennials' main tasks: Diversity, Purpose and Values, Inclusion, Flexibility, Stronger Career Prospects, and Decent working conditions.
- 3. 3/O Balinis also talked about Emotional Quotient, Change Management, and Career Progression.



• Presentation: Leadership Strategies to Influence Change in the Maritime Sector by Capt. Christian Paul D. Roa, MNI Seafarer, Dalisay Shipping Corporation

1. Capt. Roa shared his insights on leadership strategies to influence change in the maritime world. For him, there are only **three constant things in life**, one of which is CHANGE. Change is inevitable; everything must be developed; everything must be improved, and change has been happening at high speed in the maritime industry.

2. Capt. Roa shared his experiences as a cadet officer and his realization of his need to become an influential leader. He stressed that we could not influence change toward others without changing ourselves, without developing ourselves to become influential leaders. Leaders always continue learning and growing.

3. He also tackled how to improve **leadership strategies from Brian Tracy**: You must continually learn and improve; identify what leadership qualities you might be missing and understand them. Do more or less of certain things as necessary.

- 4. Capt. Roa also shared how **to improve leadership skills** and several leadership strategies to influence change in the maritime industry. To affect change, a leader has to be a Globally Minded Localist, High-Integrity Politician, Humble Hero, Strategic Executor, Tech-Savvy Humanist, a Traditional Innovator.
- 5. Finally, he encouraged everyone to start communicating as a united world to bring out the best in everyone, **be a member of the Nautical Institute**, and undoubtedly become a more effective leader in the future.

 Introduction of the Guest of Honor and Speaker Capt. John Lloyd, FNI by VAdm Eduardo Ma R Santos, AFP (Ret), AFNI, NI Ph President

1. Before introducing the speaker, VAdm Santos commended the speakers during the morning session who are the young blood, still up in coming, compared to those who are advanced in age. He stressed that all of us should be able to **listen to our younger members**, the future of our organization, and the maritime industry. He expressed his hope that all of the delegates were able to get insights from what they said and reflect on them as these could be the bases for what the older ones should do to help everybody out and to ensure the furtherance of the objectives and the furtherance and growth of NI in the Philippines.

2. Introducing Captain John Lloyd, VAdm Santos mentioned that this is not the first time they are with him. He said Captain Lloyd was present during the **Manila Command Seminar in 2014** and is happy he is with them again.

3. VAdm Santos stated that the guest of honor had been the **Chief Executive Officer of the Nautical Institute since 2017**. He was the Chief Operating Officer in 2015. Previously, Capt Lloyd was a professor at the Maritime Training of the Australian Maritime College in Tasmania. At that time, he was also the **Treasurer of GlobalMET**, which used to be AMETIAP. A very efficient and strict treasurer collecting all the money. That's why they always remembered him. After his stay at the Australian Maritime College, he also inaugurated a new maritime college in Angola following a two-year development program developed in conjunction with the city of Glasgow College and Sonangol Shipping. Before this, he held appointments as Chief Executive Officer of the Vanuatu Maritime College in Santo, Vanuatu, and senior posts at Flagship Training Limited and Warsash Maritime Centre. The guest of honor is a Master Mariner and served as a Marine Pilot in Namibia from 1994 – 1995. He is a

Master of Business Administration, a Freeman of the (UK) Honorable Company of Master Mariners, a Younger Brother of Trinity House, and a Chartered Master Mariner. Since joining The Nautical Institute, he has introduced a series of short professional development courses attracting substantial international interest and a new qualification for engineering and technical staff on DP vessels. He has recently started working more closely on key safety issues in the fishing sector, which everyone knows is neglected. He travels extensively, representing the work of The Nautical Institute and sharing his passion for safer shipping and professionalism in the maritime sector. He is currently Chair of the IMO's Human Element Industry Group (HEIG), working with NGOs on crucial safety initiatives.

4. VAdm Santos enjoined everyone to welcome Captain John Lloyd.



• Presentations: About NI and Its Strategic Development Plan 2021-2026 by Capt. John Lloyd, FNI NI CEO

Captain Lloyd presented the 2021-2026 Strategic Development Plan of the Nautical Institute. He reflected on how they developed this plan and expressed that every organization must have a reason for its existence. He said that as the Chief Executive Officer, he is privileged to work with the organization's management team to refocus the strategic plan.

1. Captain Lloyd presented the **2021-2026 Strategic Development Plan of the Nautical Institute**. He reflected on how they developed this plan and expressed that every organization must have a reason for its existence. He said that as the Chief Executive Officer, he is privileged to work with the organization's management team to refocus the strategic plan.

2. He mentioned **two key documents** which serve as their basis. The first one is the UN Sustainable Development Goals, where they looked globally at where the Nautical Institute can contribute to this instruction. As shown on the slide, he stated the key areas: quality education, gender equality, industry innovation and infrastructure, reduced inequalities, responsible consumption and production, and climate action.

3. Captain Lloyd also mentioned **important references** they used. (1) "*The Impact of Automation Technology on Employment in the Transport Sector*" developed by the International Transport Workers' Federation and World Maritime University. (2) The "*Global Maritime Professionals,*" which looked at the skills and knowledge-based required

of the maritime profession, prepared by the **International Association of Maritime Universities (IAMU)**. Capt. Lloyd stated that key stakeholders are looking at the impact of all these automation technologies. He added that generally speaking, there is a recognition in all sectors, particularly maritime, that technology would have a significant impact but assuredly would not replace the people. The skills would be different, but there is an increasing number of maritime professionals serving in the maritime transport sector.

4. Captain Lloyd showed a snapshot of the Strategic Plan 2021-2026. He explained the **deliverables from the diagram** showing the Membership and Branches, Information and Publications, Research and Relationships (previously called Projects), and Qualifications. He stated that at the top and bottom are human factors and continuing professional development, which create an envelope where they work.

5. On **Membership and Branches,** Captain Lloyd mentioned that the organization has grown from 6,827 in 2021 to 8,400. The goal is to reach 10,000 members in 2026.

6. On **Qualifications** –Captain Lloyd discussed core qualifications (e.g., STCW) and further training and certification (e.g., DPO, maritime management, logistics management) towards continuing professional development.

7. Captain Lloyd stated that **technical requirements** are rapidly changing. Today's skills are not the skills tomorrow, so it is crucial to develop our maritime professionals. He added that they are also looking at the personal and life skills that are required: adaptive learners, entrepreneurship, handling of data, decision-making, communication, collaborative working, cultural understanding, and sensitivity, which are all part of what makes a maritime professional.

8. On **publications,** Capt. Lloyd showed snapshots of Seaways – a journal for the members and usually purchased by shipping companies for their ships. He also presented the Navigator, one of the most widely globally distributed magazines in the maritime sector – 100,000 copies three times a year. He thanked those who participated in the photo competition, showing others how they used that in their practical training. This magazine, with a single focus on officers on board ships, is greatly supported by several charities funding some of its costs.

9. Capt. Lloyd also mentioned several NI books, such as the Bridge Watchkeeping.

10. Capt. Lloyd stressed the importance of Local Branches, where they will concentrate the efforts and discussions around what is essential for the local community. We are part of a global picture, but every local region has its own needs. Members can discuss these needs with regulators, maritime professionals, and training institutions to enhance our contributions. It is vital to contribute technically, but it is also crucial not to lose sight of the fraternity, comradeship, and so on – professional network.

11. On **membership benefits**, Captain Lloyd stated that his number one is the global recognition of their professional status.

12. He showed the **Navigator Magazine**, available for all members in print and online. He also presented the NI's contribution to the maritime accidents reporting scheme (MARS), which reports strange occurrences and accidents that are analyzed and shared in the worldwide maritime community for the benefit of learning.

13. Captain Lloyd discussed **NI's position in the industry**. He stated that one of the reasons for being a member is our vital link with the International Maritime Organization (IMO). He added that we are an NGO and an industry group and can make a difference in IMO's decisions. The contribution from the professional maritime sector is vital. He also discussed maritime safety, the offshore industry, maritime education (front and center), and publications.

14. Captain Lloyd also emphasized that **specifics count** – recognizing the professional status of all maritime professionals and offering free student membership to grow NI's engagement. He also stressed the importance of investing in the future. He added the significance of having access to IMO and a great network and developing presence and solutions for the challenges of today and tomorrow. He said that some of these actions align with the decarbonization agenda.

15. On **NI accreditation and certification**, Captain Lloyd mentioned that they could introduce industry standards they can monitor and apply consistently as part of their accreditation process.

16. Captain Lloyd emphasized how **NI's impact on the UN Sustainable Development Goals** includes zero hunger, life below water, and partnerships for the goals with the broader community, which are all critical for our development.

17. Captain Lloyd **advised young career professionals** to understand the broad maritime picture so that they could see opportunities available to them.

18. He stressed the **importance of collaboration** and showed some of NI's partner.

19. Capt John lauded the Philippines for being the largest NI branch in the world.

20. Finally, Captain Lloyd stressed that we are all **agents for change** in the maritime sector and encouraged everyone to make a difference.

1. Capt. LeGoubin expressed his gratitude to the NI Philippine branch for inviting him to the Nautical Institute's 50th Anniversary celebration. He also **commended the Philippines for its significant contributions to Nautical Institute's success**. He also mentioned that it was his first time visiting the country in his over 40 years of seafaring career.

2. Aligned with the theme, "*Maritime Leadership in a Changing World*," Capt. LeGoubin **highlighted various aspects of Leadership**, including challenges and opportunities for the future, the green transition of the industry, digitalization and innovation, and preparing a new generation of Seafarers.

3. Capt. LeGoubin relayed his recent experience as a mariner and his contemplation on **what** skills we should pass on to younger seafarers.

4. He shared his **experience with his first vessel** - a small cargo and passenger ship – where his captain taught him seamanship, basic seamanship, ship handling, meteorology, and many other skills he still uses today. He emphasized that the strong foundation of knowledge he gained from his first master and other mentors helped him maneuver his current ship, one of the world's largest DP2 Suezmax shuttle tankers. Captain LeGoubin stressed that the next generation of seafarers should be able to get **basic skills and mix these with the latest technology** as he did to be able to adapt to the changing times.

5. Capt. LeGoubin emphasized that knowledge can best be passed on by the informal system of knowledge transfer he called mentoring. He stated that mentoring was brought into the limelight for the last ten years since The **Nautical Institute's mentoring project** began. He highlighted this 10-minute challenge of taking somebody aside and taking a few minutes out of our busy schedule to teach them something by showing them how to do something or letting them try something for themselves under our watchful guidance.

6. Capt. LeGoubin also stressed that NI recognizes that high-quality Leadership and excellent change management are essential in accelerated development. Seafarers must gain sufficient **experiential knowledge** to be able to lead.

7. Capt. LeGoubin also highlighted the significance of recognizing that the next generation's needs, priorities, and expectations differ. He added that they must support **younger career professionals**, especially cadets trying to find a berth on a vessel to enable them to become competent watchkeeping officers.

8. Capt. LeGoubin expressed that, during his Presidency, he wanted to work with NI membership to develop ideas to ensure that every cadet who wants to go to sea can sail. He related his recent conversations with shipping companies and owners who have pledged to **help put cadets on their ships**. He encouraged everyone in the position to help support the next generation of seafarers.

9. Capt. LeGoubin also underscored the **challenge of a greener future** and the reality of the seriousness of the effects of climate change. He relayed that many of the world's leading shipping companies, including some in Asia, are heading in the right direction with 'greener' ships. These highly sophisticated ships with cutting-edge technology require the best onboard operators to sail and manage ashore.

10. He pointed out that highly trained career professionals manning these modern ships are best taught by the companies themselves. So, Captain LeGoubin, as NI President, expressed that he is asking for a commitment from these shipowners to put at least two cadets onboard every one of these new vessels, for they will be the industry's future leaders.

11. Captain LeGoubin highlighted that the over **8,000 NI members and officers are a team**, and neither can function without the other. He challenged the members to join him and use their time constructively to make that vital difference for the next generation of maritime career professionals.
